After a brief intermission, Jimmy Buffett & The Coral Reefers finally took the stage.

We found our contact person and proceeded to our vantage point, sandwiched between the sound system and the stage It was a definite surprise to see Jimmy dressed in a black tux with a Telecaster hanging around his neck. It was no surprise, however, when he tore the bow tie from around his neck and tossed it into the crowd.

The big moment came when President Clinton appeared and announced to all that, "Yes, Jimmy Buffett is a friend of mine!" Jimmy then brought his family on stage to meet the first family, and segued into the most appropriate "Changes in Latitudes, Changes in Attitudes." It was then that the President of the United States of America, the leader of the free world, and arguably the most powerful man on the face of the earth, grabbed a saxophone and jammed along with Jimmy to the roar of the crowd. piece of music from the Iguanas has the basic elements of soulful, rootsy expression and engaging rhythm, but any attempt to categorize or label the New Orleansbased band is impossible. As their debut album on Margaritaville Records shows, they find the right qualities for Iguanas music in everything from New Orleans rhythm and blues to Tex-Mex conjunto music and all points in between.

The Iguanas kick off the album with the syncopated hometown beat of "Late At Night" and then move immediately to the Latin atmosphere of "Para Donde Vas." From that point, any style of music is fair game, from the country rock of "This Night of Sin" to the Mexican polka of "Take Your Pictures, Your Letters And Your Ring," from the twin tenor saxophone sound of "If I Turned To You" to the accordion lead on "Dark And Dangerous Love." They create a hypnotic atmosphere for legendary New Orleans writer Allen Toussaint's "Fortune Teller," a contrast to the rocking-good advice set forth in "Don't Treat Her Mean." Lyrically as well as musically, the Iguanas keep the scenery changing constantly, from the poetic Spanish imagery of "Por Mi Camino (Along My Way)" and the romance of "No Te Olividare (I Won't Forget You)" to the direct one-on-one confessional of "Nervous" and the otherwoman situation of "You Make It Hard."

The sound of the Iguanas came to life in New Orleans in 1990, but it is rooted all across North America in the diverse backgrounds of the five band members:

Joe Cabral, vocals, tenor sax and bajo-sexto (a Mexican rhythm guitar), was raised in Omaha where his first musical experiences came in his fathers Mexican hand. Attending college in Missoula, MT., he discovered Chicago blues, New Orleans R&B and honking sax players.

Rod Hodges, vocals, guitar and accordion, began playing guitar in San Francisco-area blues and rock bands at the age of 14. Later, while playing in a blues band in Colorado, he rediscovered the conjunto music that was a part of his mother's Mexican heritage. Iuspired by master musician Flaco Jimenez, he took up the accordion.

Willie Panker, drums began playing blues in his hometown of Chicago at the age of 10. He has performed with such blues greats as James Cotton, Albert Collins and Junior Wells.

Rene Coman, bass, is a native of New Orleans. A professional musician since high school, he has toured the U.S. and Europe. His recording credits include Alex Chilton, Guitar Slim Jr. and Willy De Ville. He also produced an album for Tav Falco's Panther Burns of Memphis.

Derek Huston, tenor sax and background vocals, grew up in Washington, D.C., playing roots-rock, New Orleans R&B and rockabilly music. He majored in music at Duke University and moved to New Orleans on Halloween, 1990.

In the late 1980's Cabral and Hodges moved south from Colorado to pursue their favorite music; the distinctive New Orleans style of rhythm and blues. Initially they played New Orleans style music, but when they threw in some music from their Mexican heritage, the fans loved it. The Iguanas quickly became the hottest new band in New Orleans, winning the 1990 Big Easy Award for Best Emerging Talent. The following year they received a Big Easy Award for Best Rock Band, and a spot at the Jazz and Heritage Festival. Their debut album was produced by Justin Niebank, a veteran of the Chicago blues scene.

Catch the Iguanas this month on their southern Spring Break Tour, and also this summer opening for Jimmy Buffett & The Coral Reefer Band.



very year at Austin's South by Southwest music conference, the who's hot buzz quotient gets a little more frenzied.

The most unusual case of trendy-band buzz in recent memory happened three years ago, when most of the preshow-case hype centered on an unknown band from New Orleans called the Iguanas. The word was they were fronted by a pair of tenor-sax honkers, both of whom could sing in English and Spanish. Its music, according to a legion of music fans who'd never seen the group live, ranged from "calypso" and "Tex-Mex" to "New Orleans R&B" and "roots rock." The

best pregig summation came from a crusty guy who'd seen the band at Tipitina's in New Orleans.

"It's the best band in Nawlins," he slurred late one night. Everyone in the room agreed that any band that could excite a musically jaded, not to mention well-lubed, New Orleans native had to be worth a look.

The band's showcase the following night at Austin's shoebox-size Continental Club was packed full of wide-eyed critics and Texas music celebs. Unlike most hype-assisted acts, the Iguanas delivered in spades.

As the set progressed, the points of the

Iguana style became apparent - blues, Tex-Mex, and lots of saxophone powered R&B of the King Curtis-Sam Taylor variety. Musically, the Iguanas sound remarkably like Los Lobos - border rock with New Orleans second-line rhythms and Caribbean dance music spiced in to give it a kick.

When asked to describe their music, all the band's two reed rockers, Joe Cabral and Derek Huston, could do was shrug. "Actually, we still have trouble describing it," Cabral said. He and the rest of the band were at New Orleans Recording Company, a well-known studio outside

N.O. where the group is currently recording it's debut album for Margaritaville Records, the MCA-distributed label owned by Jimmy Buffett.

"It's definitely a New Orleans kind of thing," Derek Huston says, still searching for words to capture the band's music. Much of it comes from the diverse musical personality of the Big Easy. "It's a New Orleans city sound, closer to mambo than to Cajun music. I don't know if there's anywhere else other than New Orleans where a band and a sound like ours could have evolved."

Most bands that attempt so many dif-

ferent kinds of music end up with a jumbled sound that has no identifiable thread. In both their original music and their bizarro covers of long-lost classics, the Iguanas have mastered a convincing style. It's an unmistakable sound that works as well with a polka or a waltz as it does with hard-drivin' rocker. The sight of twin saxophone leads also makes the band a hot live act.

"Rather than discussing the different styles that go into it, the best way to describe our music is to say it's about dancing, about a groove and about having a hell of a good time."

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
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
CONCERT ANNOUNCEMENT...PLEASE READ
