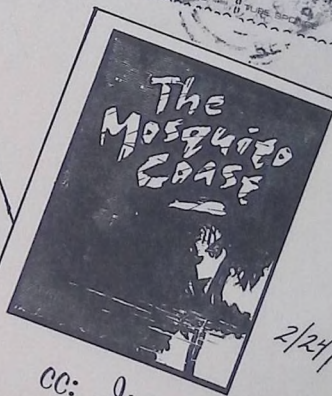
I had a great time today. (So did Angel).

JIMMY'S MERMAIDS

*Sometimes I see me
as an old manatee . . .*

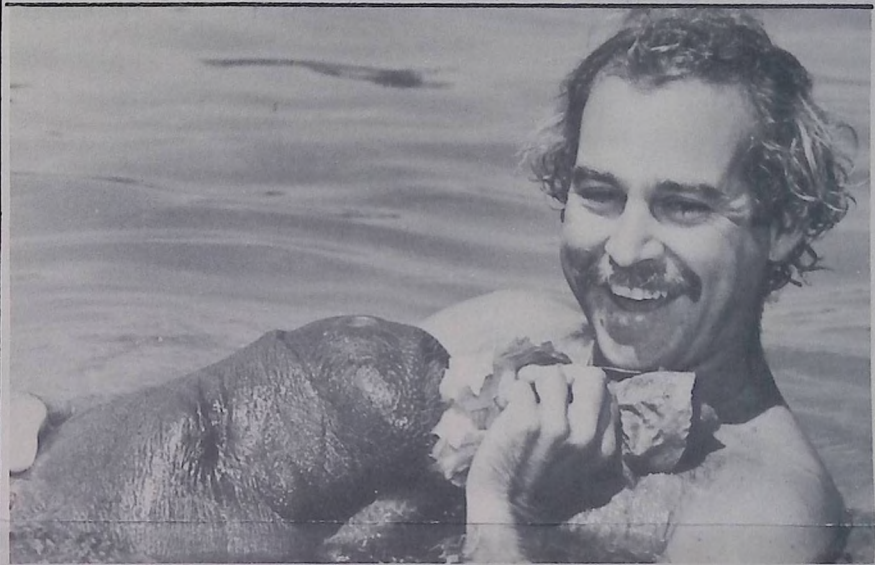
In the late fifteenth century, Christopher Columbus believed that manatees spotted from afar were actually mermaids. In fact, their biological name, Sirenia, is derived from the beautiful sirens—enticing maidens who lured sailors to their destruction on the ocean's rocks. But just as modern knowledge has debunked the myths of mermaid and siren, so modern man is pushing the manatee ever closer to extinction.

Close up, they don't look much like mermaids. Manatees grow to anywhere between eight and fourteen feet long, and can weigh as much as a ton. These placid vegetarians inhabit Florida's estuaries, rivers, and saltwater bays—living on hyacinths and water weeds; peacefully sleeping, eating, and playing. Lately, however, the manatees' pleasant lives are becoming much more hazardous—in 1985, there were 120 known manatee deaths in Florida. Over one quarter of these deaths were caused by man, as manatees were involved in collisions with boats and barges.

Manatees have no natural enemies except man. Careless handling of powerboats, or boating at excessive speeds, can result in a manatee's hide being cut to ribbons by propellers—and a dead or seriously injured animal.

It was five years ago that a manatee, injured probably by a boat propeller, drifted by Jimmy Buffett as he cleaned the side of his sailboat. For Jimmy as well as the manatee, it was a fateful

meeting.

Jimmy's music had long reflected his pleasure at *living his life like a song*: a mellow tropical lifestyle. He saw the threat to the manatees as symbolic of a hurry-up world where these marine mammals—and indeed, much of Florida's wildlife and easygoing existence—had no place. Jimmy Buffett wanted no part of a world like that.

The result? Jimmy is now Chairman of the Save the Manatee Committee, which is sponsored by the Florida Department of Natural Resources and the Florida Audubon Society. The Committee is spearheading the fight for the manatees' survival by raising funds for continued study of the animals, as well as increasing awareness of the manatees' needs through educational programs. Jimmy Buffett can be seen in public service announcements warning

boaters to slow in manatee areas and respect no-wake zones.

Not long ago the Save the Manatee Committee began an Adopt-a-Manatee program. Adoptive "parents" sponsor an individual manatee and receive photos and periodic updates of their "child's" activities. Jimmy Buffett's Margaritaville Store is proud to announce its sponsorship of Margarito

and Luther, a pair of young manatee brothers.
